





Transition Project: Politics (A Level)

Induction Tasks

1. Prepare a summary of the main results of the 2024 general election.

You may want to focus on:

Why was the election called in the first place?

Percentage vote share of each party,

Turnout,

Seats won in parliament for each party,

Changes in from last election

The voting behaviour of various groups (by age, gender, income, ethnicity etc.) Main issues in the election

Graphs and charts are very useful for this. You can research both national results and local results for your own constituency.

2. Design a poster that shows the basics of how the UK system of Government works

An Overview of The British Political System

Things that need to be included:

- Make-up of The Government (PM and Cabinet),
- Makeup of Parliament (House of Commons, House of Lords),
- Different levels of Government

Regional: Scottish Parliament, Welsh Assembly, Northern Ireland Assembly

Local: Councils (concentrate on your local council)

Which electoral systems are used for each system? Who currently controls them? Results of Recent Referendums. You could use pictures, diagrams and charts.

Research Tips:

Use quality media esp. The Times, The Guardian, The Telegraph, The BBC, The Independent. Most of these sites have sections devoted to political issues and discussions of important aspects of the 2019 general election.

Bonus Task

Do the same for the last (2024) local council elections, and the last elections to the devolved assemblies (Scottish parliament, Welsh Assembly and NI Assembly) & the last West Yorkshire Mayor results.
