Vokabeln

Elektronische Zigaretten - die sogenannten E-Zigaretten - sind nicht ungefährlich. Sie machen süchtig und können gesundheitliche Schäden verursachen.

Mehr als eine Million Deutsche rauchen E-Zigaretten. Sie halten sie für gesünder als normale Zigaretten. Schließlich wird kein Tabak verbrannt und kein Teer inhaliert. Stattdessen wird aus einer Flüssigkeit ein Dampf produziert, der dann geraucht wird.

Doch dieser Dampf scheint gefährlich zu sein. Das ist das Ergebnis einer Studie vom Deutschen Krebsforschungszentrum. Der Dampf besteht hauptsächlich aus Propylenglykol, einer Substanz, die auch als Frostschutzmittel benutzt wird. Propylenglykol kann innere Organe schädigen.

Andere Substanzen der E-Zigaretten sind bisher wenig oder gar nicht untersucht. So wissen die meisten E-Raucher also nicht, welche Stoffe sie in welcher Menge inhalieren. Deshalb - so die Experten - kann man nicht von "gesundem Rauchen" sprechen. Ob E-Zigaretten helfen, das Rauchen aufzugeben, ist unklar.
