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On 30th of June 2022, The Crossley Heath School celebrated a very special day for the school - Diversity Day. Each year group spent one period out of lessons to celebrate different elements of diversity. They enjoyed lots of multicultural activities and even ate multicultural food together. We are privileged to have such a diverse school!

During this time there was an assembly led by officers from West Yorkshire police explaining how common it can be for hate crimes and incidents to happen in West Yorkshire and how we need to spread awareness about the importance of celebrating diversity.

Additionally, they had a stall outside where students could ask further questions if they wanted to find out more, which many students did. We interviewed Jay, a PCSO (police community support officer) for West Yorkshire police based out of Halifax. Jay told us that his role was to engage with people regarding diversity and hate crime and to raise awareness about the harm that prejudice like homophobia can cause.

After this, pupils went outside where they could participate in multiple activities including getting beautiful henna designs, getting LGBTQ+ flags painted onto them, getting a selfie on the selfie stand and a picture by the beautifully made Rainbow Wings, and writing on the graffiti wall.

Susan in Y9 told us that she had really enjoyed the atmosphere of the day with students having fun whilst being made aware of diversity and culture. As well as that, she thought that the cultural dress and non-uniform was brilliant as many students were dressed up in cultural clothes to express themselves.

There was a stall for St Augustine's - a local charity that works with refugees in Halifax. Diversity, equality and inclusion to St Augustine's Centre means that everyone is not just respected for what they can bring to the centre - their qualities, skills and languages - but also celebrated for who they are and where they are from.



Mandarin student adventures 2022







This year has been another busy one for students on our Mandarin Excellence Programme. This year our first cohort of MEP students sat their examinations with the HSK3 Chinese proficiency test in the autumn and the GCSE this summer. We also welcomed our new cohort of Y7 students onto the programme. They have made a great start and got to show their skills when they attended the Intensive Learning Day hosted by Leeds University alongside other schools. Y10 took part in a 4-day project based on the theme of tourism and culminating in a visit to Sheffield University's East Asian Studies department where students had lectures and got an insight into university life. And Y9 have just finished a two week 'virtual China' project where they have been engaging in online activities with students and teachers in China to learn more about the culture, people and places. Students enjoyed the virtual visit to China and were successful in producing the winning video in the national competition against other MEP schools. Students were given the brief to design a sustainable transport system which involved discussing environmental issues for the use of resources in transportation, including rising costs for energy and fuel and considering whether local journeys can be made via alternative means.

When all our designs were finally submitted, five of our entries received a certificate of commendation and two of these won prizes. Well done to our entrant who came first overall and who was awarded the prize for Best Effort -**Muhammad Zubayr.** Congratulations also to our second place designer, William Isaac Barker.

Our Year in MedSoc

The sixth form committee of the Crossley Heath Medical Society have enjoyed leading sessions every week since November of this year on everything about medicine, dentistry, allied health & veterinary medicine! We are pleased to have had a full classroom of keen Y10 and Y11 students every Tuesday lunchtime who have loved taking part in discussions and learning about working within these incredible careers.

With the launch of MedSoc, we also started our Instagram account @crossleyheathmedsoc on which we posted regular updates about our weekly sessions. The Instagram account has proven very popular, with the UK's largest Medical Social Enterprise, Medic Mentor featuring us on their own Instagram story! Medic Mentor provides students with fantastic resources and advice so be sure to check out their website.

Throughout the year we have had sessions focused on the key areas of medical ethics (such as the pillars of medical ethics and the idea of capacity and consent), fascinating medical case studies and the concept of problembased learning, healthcare specialties such as surgery and sessions on how to boost university applications and develop skills like honesty, empathy and teamwork which are key to working in healthcare.

In our last session of the year, we did a Q&A session with the sixth form committee members answering any more queries the students had and helping them decide if a career in healthcare is right for them. There has been hugely positive feedback from all student attendees this year and we are so grateful for everyone who came to take part in our wonderful activities.

After the success of this year's MedSoc, we are planning a handover to a new team of Y12s in the autumn, so if you are currently in Y11 and thinking about studying in healthcare, do consider applying for a role in the committee next year!

A visit from the Bank of England

We were extremely fortunate in June to host a visit from Jonathan Grant, the Head of Legal for Central Banking at the Bank of England.

Jonathan has worked in a number of roles at the Bank for over 19 years and currently runs a division of over 30 lawyers providing legal advice covering all the bank's operational areas. He also worked for 5 years in Hong Kong and was an associate at Clifford Chance prior to joining the Bank.

During his visit, Jonathan delivered an informative presentation on routes into law and finance to students in Y10 and our Sixth Form. He then met Y12 students studying Economics and Business students for an in-depth Q & A session.

Jonathan was impressed by the high calibre questions posed by the students during the session and he was able to provide a rare insight into how the Bank views the current issues relating to the cost of living crisis and the long-term view they need to take when considering how to manage the situation.

The talking points also branched out into risks associated with cryptocurrencies and whether the Bank of England had done enough to restore consumer confidence after the Financial Crisis of 2008.

We are grateful that Jonathan was able to visit our school and we are keen to explore potential opportunities to work with their new regional offices going forward.







Y7 visit Magna Science Centre!



On 9th June, our excited Y7 students spent an amazing day at Magna Science Adventure Centre in Sheffield. Students and their science teachers explored pavilions themed around Air, Earth, Fire and Water and were able to get stuck in to a variety of interactive tasks including using water canons, forming and destroying tornadoes, and operating a JCB! Working in teams, students also completed hands-on workshops, using their knowledge of forces to build water rockets or hot air balloons. We travelled down to our hotel in Wembley and then straight off to soak up the sights and sounds of Covent Garden followed by an essential stop at Pizza Hut before walking to our first show at the Cambridge Theatre - Matilda.

Our 'Revolting Children' thoroughly enjoyed the show and were singing the songs on the coach all the way back to the hotel.

The next day, after breakfast, we set off to catch a lovely boat along the Thames. We were treated to an explanation of some of the important and historical buildings on the waterfront. Walking past Westminster coincided with the news reports of the resignations so there were lots of world press setting up and it felt like a big announcement was about to happen... We headed off back into the world of fantasy to the matinee of Wicked at the Apollo theatre.

Our Music GCSE students are very familiar with the end of act 1





epic song 'Defying Gravity' as it is one of the 'set works' we study on the course. The 'prequel' story to the familiar Wizard of Oz story was cleverly constructed to introduce the characters we know and love from the classic story.

The coach journey out of London was hot and slow but thankfully the politicians had been kind enough to hold their announcements a little longer in time for us to exit the capital. A couple of movies on the coach helped to pass the time on our journey back to Yorkshire. The students were in high spirits and were superbly behaved; a great trip for all concerned. As an ambassador for the Teen Yoga Foundation charity, it was an incredible honour to participate in a captivating discussion about yoga's potential to ameliorate the mental health crisis faced by young people. During this discussion, my knowledge of the crisis greatly increased. I learned that currently, 1 in 4 young people have reportedly engaged in self-harm (just in the UK – a first-world sovereign state) and it has taken up to 4 vears for a child to receive a diagnosis for their mental health disorder. The exponentially increasing statistics of children experiencing bullying, loneliness and much more, was heart-breaking.

I've always been quite sceptical about the effort and attention that leaders and professionals direct towards mental health - I think it's easy to believe that mental health is completely overlooked, nobody is fighting for positive changes and that individual efforts don't really make a difference - but my feelings about this categorically changed during this meeting.

It was uplifting and eye-opening to be in the presence of MPs, doctors, teachers, charity workers and other healthcare professionals, who do recognise the issue and are fighting for a better future for young people's mental health. I delivered a speech about my own past mental health struggles; how practicing yoga has helped me and how I believe it can improve life for many others if they're given access to it. When preparing the speech beforehand, I was doubtful about how much it would benefit the meeting however, the abundance of positive feedback I received afterwards was amazing. This experience showed me of the immense impact that individual voices can have. Young people especially can influence and contribute to a better future for our world - whether that is from the angle of mental health, the environment or fighting discrimination.

Since the event, I have written and published an article on the topic of the meeting, and have been deeply inspired to use my voice through further writing, sharing information on social media platforms, and talking to people around me to educate myself and others about current, threatening world issues and what we can do, as individuals, to contribute towards improving these.

It is never too late to begin to use your voice, engage in charity work, participate in progressive movements etc. because our world and our people desperately need our attention and help with the countless issues that we are currently facing.



Debating Society winners!


Our lower school Debating Society has been meeting weekly to work through motions and practise debates with students either taking active part or forming part of the audience/ chair/time keeping roles.

ECO CLUB: Hopes for the Future

The members of eco-club are very aware and active people, who know that environmental issues have been increasing, and as they increase, the need for others to play their part in reducing negative impacts on the environment does too. This can be done in several ways: from recycling materials such as plastic, to buying a reusable water bottle, or even just turning off the light switch when leaving a room. However, there are many different problems around the world today that range from industrial fishing to climate change, and for each varying concern there are various ways we can help. At Eco-Club, this is our main focus - what can we do to have a role in creating an ideal environment?

Our fundraiser Sustainability Day raised over £800 and with a better financial stance, options for making a sustainable future became a lot more open; consequently, it was decided that one of the biggest hopes for our future is installing recycling bins at school. In 2021, the recycling rate was only 63.2%. The main source of plastic waste at school is from pre-packaged food and instead of this being disposed in a normal litter bin, it makes much more sense for it to be disposed of in a way beneficial to all. This idea does require cooperation from all members of the Crossley Heath community, and the bins should be used in a way that is sensible and respectful of its purpose – to recycle a certain type of material. Plastic recycling bins will not be alone, but will be joined by paper recycling bins, perhaps as well as metal, paper and glass bins also.

We also hope to start using compost bins. Many students and staff consume their lunch and sometimes breakfast at school. However, it is understandable that food cannot always be finished, or any scraps from excellent cooking by the kitchen staff cannot be used, and this can lead to high levels of wastage. An easy way to prevent this is by using compost bins – this is a sustainable method that ensures minimum levels of wastage whilst also making soil, certainly a desirable product to the people at Gardening Club.

Our final aim is to have accessible water fountains around the school buildings and grounds. Instead of buying single-use plastic water bottles, buying a reusable water bottle is a much more environmentally friendly option. By doing this, it is hoped that the use of plastic bottles will cease, and that means the path to a sustainable, environmentally friendly future is a step closer.

There were some great performances on the track and in the field with our girls team finishing in 4th place and the boys in 5th place overall. We didn't qualify for the next round but our athletes enjoyed the experience of competing against athletes from other schools across the county.

At the Calderdale Super 8s Competition held at Spring Hall, there were again some strong performances from our Y7 and Y8 athletes . We finished in 2nd place overall out of ten schools, just one point behind rivals North Halifax! Our Y8s won all their relay races along with others, and special mention to Alex Burke who beat a nationally-ranked fell runner, and to Zara Blanchard who was victorious in the 1500 metres after stepping in last minute as a substitute.

Congratulations to two of our students, Y13 Tegan Hamilton-Adams and Y12 Isabel Richardson, who were selected to represent Calderdale in the West Yorkshire Championships. Tegan came 2nd in the 400m hurdles and Isabel won the 3,000m race. Isabel was then selected to represent West Yorkshire in the English Schools Athletics championships which this year was held in Manchester, where she ran a personal best time in the senior girls 1500m event.

ROUNDERS

Rounders has continued to be a popular summer time sport at school, with many girls attending lunchtime practice. We have played matches against Halifax Academy, Ryburn, North Halifax and Huddersfield Grammar and have also taken part in the Calderdale tournaments held at Brighouse High. Hot on the heels of their Yorkshire Championships victory two weeks ago, the team of 8 athletes (Chloe and Katie are both captain and vice captain respectively), were awarded an impressive 55 points by the 15 judges for their routine from the musical "Six". They compete in a division of 21 teams from around the country with the club recently moving from Halifax to Bradford.

SQUASH

But after a below par performance with the bat, Crossley Heath had to produce a strong display of bowling to win this game and they did that superbly.

Crossley's batted first and, despite some quick runs off the first two overs, Monty Ramsden and Ollie Simpson were out early. Sebby Hawke and Ayaan Akram held firm for a while, Ayaan top scoring on 25, but wickets tumbled against some good Kettlethorpe bowling.

A total of just 98 runs put pressure on the Crossley's bowlers but they stepped up and delivered with pace and accuracy to squeeze the confidence out of their opponents from the first ball. Opening pair Ollie and Sebby bowled with speed and swing and claimed two wickets in their first overs. Kettlethorpe were







never let off from pressure with Sebby getting two more wickets in his second over. He ended the game with four wickets. The Crossley's team showed that they have bowling strength throughout with Matthew Dakin, Ayaan, Monty, Matthew Allcock and Indraneil Nair all showing well. But the biggest cheer went up when Isaac Musgrave, relatively new to the sport, claimed the last wicket. Crossley's won by 52 runs.

Y9 CRICKET

The Y9 (U14) cricket team secured their place in R3 of the Yorkshire County Cup with a dominant performance against an accomplished Holmfirth High side. Winning the toss and electing to bat first, Crossley's began in their, now, customary fashion with Jack Wilkinson and Om Behera at the crease and playing some sublime shots. They made 100 runs between them and set a solid foundation for the Crossley's team.

When Wilkinson was uncharacteristically dismissed for 34, with a full stretch catch at mid-wicket, Behera then stepped up his game to thrash 66 not out with some elegant and frequent cuts to the boundary. Captain Matt Brearley knocked a supportive 12 not out coming in at number 3. Helped by some loose bowling by the Holmfirth team, Crossley's ended their innings on 151 for 1.

The action required to win the game was clear at the change of innings. Disciplined and consistent bowling to put pressure on the home batsmen was a priority. This was achieved superbly. Openers Wilkinson and Samir Ayub bowled with pace and variation to threaten and frustrate the good batting pair for Holmfirth. Ayub's attack resulted in their opener spooning the ball for a second time with Ayub taking the catch too to remove him and set the tone for the rest of the bowling attack. Wilkinson's line and occasional slower ball should have taken wickets but he was unlucky.

After 8 overs Holmfirth required an unlikely run rate and when Brearley, began his spell with real zip, the pressure was maintained and Holmfirth were losing hope with every ball. Oscar Grimes (Y8), Lakshya Kaushik and Harvey Bhullar combined to give a variety of bowling that never let the batters settle into a rhythm and the home side fell 63 runs short.
