

Links Forged with Partner Schools in China

From 13th to 19th November Deputy Head, Mr Brownlie attended the 2023 International Forum for School Principals organised by the Education Department of Jiangsu Province, China. He was part of a delegation from primary and secondary schools in West Yorkshire. Over the course of the six days Mr Brownlie visited schools in 4 different cities, including three Senior High Schools and two Middle Schools, as well as attending the International Forum in Xuzhou City alongside delegates from across Asia, Europe, North America, and Australasia.

The schools visited were impressive not just for their scale (most had approximately 3,000 students) but also the facilities, which were more akin to university campuses and all built in recent years. Jiangsu Province is one of the wealthiest in China and it was clear that the provincial government was investing heavily in education. The dedication of this funding was matched by the value that staff, students and parents placed in education. Senior high schools focus on preparing students for the fiercely competitive university entrance exam, the *Gau Kao*. The school day starts at 6:30 and

students (and teachers) remain in school until 22:00. Despite the long days, students were happy and focused on their studies, though when told about the school day in England they all said they would prefer our system! At school students study the full range of subjects, but can 'major' in certain areas towards the end of senior high. The academic curriculum is supplemented by sports, drama, arts and music and the visitors saw many examples of this in action.

As a result of the trip, Crossley Heath now has two partner schools with whom we plan to work going forward:

Tongzhou Senior High School in Nantong, a modern city renowned for its excellence in education. Yangzi High School in Nanjing, the provincial capital.

We are very much looking forward to working with our new partners and opening up additional opportunities for our students.






Year 7 Book Cover Designs



Year 9 Creative Industries Careers Day

On Monday 27th November, our Year 9 students were treated to a full-day of inspiring talks and workshops from a host of our ex-Crossley Heath students who work within the creative industries.

The day was put on by the Visual Arts team to promote the subject ahead of the Year 9 options process; however, more importantly it was an opportunity to celebrate the success of some of our talented ex-students and for them to share their journey into their career since leaving The Crossley Heath School.

The day began with an online virtual presentation from ex-Head Boy, Charles Royle (attended 2009 – 2016) who was on a short vacation in Los Angeles, California. Charles left Crossley Heath after studying his A-levels to attend the top design school in the world, Parson's School of Design in New York, where he majored in Fashion Design. Due to the Covid pandemic, Charles was forced to return to the UK where he completed his MA in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Management and is now working for YOOX Net-A-Porter Group as an Innovation Manager.

Following this interesting talk, students split off into groups to complete a carousel of half a dozen 30-minute presentations from a range of ex-students.

They included face-to-face talks from Tom Brown (attended 2004 – 2011) who studied at Bournemouth University completing his degree in Computer Visualisation and Animation, and currently works for DNEG; Alice Banham (attended 2005 - 2012) who studied at Northumbria University completing her degree in Advertising and now works for IMA-HOME; Ellie Szanyi (nee Dyson) (attended 2003 -2010) who completed her degree in Design for Film and Television at Nottingham Trent University, and now works as an Art Director with the likes of the BBC, ITV, C4, SKY and Paramount+ among those she has worked for; Cameron McGarvey (attended 2008 – 2015) who is now a freelance photographer and videographer after completing an apprenticeship in Design; Product Katie Nancarrow (attended 2011 – 2018) who is currently an Architectural Assistant after completing her BA Architecture at University of



Manchester.





Finally, students also watched a pre-recorded video from Annie Wade Smith (attended 2007 – 2014) who was unable to join us in person but wanted to tell students all about her job as a Dynamic Interpersonal Therapist working in the NHS with people suffering from trauma or severe mental health. Annie completed her degree in Psychology at University of Liverpool, and her talk demonstrated to students that there are careers out there that can marry up a love of art and creativity with other industries and sectors.

Following the lunch break, students gathered once more in the main school hall to link up virtually with another ex-student, Hannah Sloan Wood, who lives and works in Copenhagen. Hannah left Crossley Heath in 2008 to study Architecture at The University of Sheffield followed by an MA in Political Architecture and Sustainability at the Royal Danish Academy, School of Architecture. Hannah now works for an architecture company, SLA, whilst also teaching as an MA Lecturer at the Royal Danish Academy where she once studied herself.

(attended 2005 – 2012) studied Architecture at The University of Nottingham and now works as an architect for Piercy & Company; Amanda McDermott (nee Browning) (attended 1998 – 2005) completed her degree in Architecture and Landscape Architecture at The University of Sheffield and now works as a Senior landscape architect at 2B Landscape Consultancy Ltd. She was joined in her presentation and workshop by Hafeez Mumraz (attended 2010 – 2017) who also studied Landscape Architecture at Leeds Beckett University. Hafeez now works as Project Specification Support at Marshalls plc and is living proof of how impactful these careers days can be, having spoken with Amanda several years ago, he was later inspired to also go on to complete his degree in Landscape Architecture too!

With the Creative Arts being, annually, the fourth most popular course choice at university, with well over 50,000 creative courses available, there is something out there for all of our talented and creative students who are just about to embark upon the same journey that the speakers of this exciting day did when they chose to study this GCSE subject. The Visual Arts team hope that this opportunity has helped to open our students' eyes to the possibilities available to them, and even if they are not amazing at drawing or painting, there is so much more on offer if they did choose to study this as one of their GCSE subjects

Entertainment for the audience was provided by renditions of some classic pieces including 'Yesterday', 'I Feel Good' and 'Baker Street.'






NETBALL




The department also won for the school £200 towards DT equipment.
