Safeguarding



At The Crossley Heath School we adopt a **whole school approach** to safeguarding and this is achieved through our policies and processes in order to operate with the best interests of the child being paramount. We encourage all staff to use their professional curiosity and to always be critical with what they see and hear. The school follows guidance and protocols outlined by Calderdale's Safeguarding Board. Our school is a safe space for all students.

PREVENT

Prevent is 1 of the 4 elements of <u>CONTEST</u>, the UK government's counter terrorism strategy and aims to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. As a parent, you need to be aware that individuals and groups with extremist views use the internet and social media to spread their ideologies. Children spend a lot of time online, and this has made them more susceptible to extremism, whether from Islamists or the far right.

Extremist groups tap into young people's insecurities. They often claim to offer answers and promise a sense of identity that vulnerable young people often seek. These feelings of insecurity can become more heightened when a child is feeling:

- Marginalised from society
- Trapped between two cultures
- Excluded from the mainstream

As part of their recruitment strategy, extremist groups also work to undermine the authority of parents. Extremist groups also use very sophisticated methods to trigger feelings of anger, injustice and shame that a child might feel.

WHO IS PREVENT FOR?

They tackle both the causes and risk factors that can lead someone to become radicalised. It directly supports those who are at risk through early intervention, is resourced to risk and addresses all forms of terrorism and extremism. It is there to be support young people, parents and schools.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I AM WORRIED ABOUT MY CHILD?

If you notice a change in your child that concerns you. You can contact your child's Pastoral Leader or <u>PREVENT direct for advice</u>. Early Intervention is key. But it's important to remember that any child can be affected by extremism. You can play a vital role by providing emotional support that acts as an alternative to the extremist narratives that your child might feel comfortable believing.

It's not easy to talk to your child about the dangers of extremism, but as with issues such as sex and drugs, it's necessary. Give your child a safe space where they can talk about difficult subjects. The more you talk, the more confident your child will become in challenging extremist narratives.

Safeguarding Concern?

We invest heavily in safeguarding training for staff. Our Progress and Pastoral Leaders are externally trained to Desingated Safeguarding Lead level. VAPING.

Young people vaping is huge concern in Calderdale. There have been cases of young people ending up in hospital, vapes being spiced with drugs and young people quickly becoming addicted to nicotine. As well as health risks, there are significant environmental risks caused by the manufacture and discarding of ecigarettes. Vaping is using an electronic or e-cigarette (a 'vape'). E-cigarettes are filled with a liquid known as e-liquid, e-juice or vape juice. They can be bought pre-filled and disposable, or refillable.

The liquid often come in a variety of 'flavours' that can appeal to children, such as berry, watermelon, cola and mint. The e-cigarette heats this liquid until it becomes a vapour, which is then breathed in.

It's **illegal** to sell e-cigarettes containing nicotine to under-18s.

In brief, our policy is that:

Possession of a vape in school will be considered 'serious misbehaviour'. Any student caught using or supplying vapes in school risks being excluded from school

When should I report?

If you're worried that your child is being groomed online or sexually exploited you should report your concerns to CEOP.

It is not always easy to spot the signs of online grooming and sexual exploitation so if you have any concern at all about someone your child is in contact with, you should get in touch.

You should always report if your child is or has been in contact with someone who is:

- Chatting online to your child about sex
- Asking them to do sexual things on webcam
- Asking to meet up if they've only met them online
- Requesting sexual pictures
- Forcing them into sexual activity
- Making them feel unsafe

CEOP is part of the National Crime Agency and can investigate what is happening – with the assurance that the safety and wellbeing of your child is paramount at all times.

If you are concerned that your child is in immediate danger, call 999.

How do I make a report?

You can make a report to CEOP using the CEOP Safety Centre.
